Arizona Snow Bowl, Flagstaff

Jerome State Historic Park, Jerome

This park features a mansion, built in 1916 by mining mogul James "Rawhide Jimmy" Douglas, atop a hill overlooking his Little Daisy Mine. This former home is now a museum devoted to the Douglas family and history of Jerome.

At approximately 0.75 miles long, this is the longest cave of its kind in Arizona, and it is freely accessible to the general public. Remember to bring your jacket and a bright head lamp to see all there is to see!
